# NEW WORLD TOURNAMENTS

Kerikeri Bridge Club held dual Junior and Open tournaments on the weekend of 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> August, generously supported by New World.

The Open 5A turned out to be a family affair, with mother-and-son duo Hamish and Sue Brown achieving victory with an average of 63.40% over the two sessions, followed by Anna Chappell and Marilyn Kennedy who scored 58.24%.

The Junior Pairs turned out to an intensely close competition: Elfy Patek and Tracey Kastelan came out on top with 56.68% – but anything could have happened, with 2<sup>nd</sup> place Ron Bywater and Julie Rossitor scoring 56.53% and both 3<sup>rd</sup> placing pairs ending on 55.68%.

# Congratulations OUR NEWEST GRAND MASTER

**Kevin Hu** has been playing bridge since 2017, and after an explosive last few years is our region's newest Grand Master, achieving a total of 1000 A and B points (with at least 500 As) – while still being a Youth player.

After having already comfortably achieved the requisite 500 A points for the status, Kevin saw his opportunity in a local 8B Multigrade. He needed only 5 Bs for promotion.


The first session was a resounding success. Playing with **Tim Pan**, the pair achieved 64.77% over 28 boards, a full 10% above the next pair in their section.

A maths challenge from that session: What scores 1800?



After the opponents opened 1 ♠, Kevin showed a strong hand with hearts, his partner jumped to 3NT, which their opponents doubled.

# What would you do?



Run to the relative safety of 4♥? Perhaps you would have feared the diamond suit – and been scared of a bad heart break. Then you would have turned a top board into an average-minus.

Kevin had no such reservations, trusting his partner's 3NT bid completely. He pulled out the blue card (metaphorically, the bidding was all written)... and was soon scoring up 1800 for a redoubled game and two overtricks.

Despite their first session lead, Kevin and Tim couldn't quite win his "promotion" tournament, scoring only 53% in the afternoon – but second place more than sufficed.

Congratulations, then, to the victors, **Graham Wakefield** and **Mark Robertson**, who had a great day scoring 58.44% and 62.91% respectively over the two sessions.

# Mell Played

You are South, playing Pairs, declarer in 3NT after East overcalled 1♥. West dutifully leads ♥K, and East plays ♥A and another (West discarding the ♠7).

**Not an easy board** – 75% of declarers in the contract failed to make it. **Warning**: Counting to 13 required!




There are only **seven tricks off the top**, and *maybe* a working club finesse? In any case, Kevin thought the club suit was worth a try.

**♣** AJ85

After the  $\P$ K, East kindly covered the 9 with their T, and West's spade discard exposed the break. Now Kevin was cold for 9 tricks... but saw an opportunity for more.

Knowing that East had five hearts (from their overcall) and five clubs (from the last trick), Kevin was very nearly playing the board "double-dummy". After cashing two spades, East's shape was down to only 2515 or 3505.






West would be under pressure when he took another club finesse – short in both hearts and clubs, they were likely to hold ♠QJ and ♠QJ. With the ♠T still in dummy, they couldn't relinquish their diamonds. Another two rounds of clubs saw West uncomfortably discard the ♠8 and ♠J.

Perhaps if Kevin knew how unsuccessful other declarers would be, he wouldn't have taken the risk. But he played for the distribution favoured by the odds – and was rewarded when West inserted the \$\int\$J, and East followed low.

In this **four-card ending**, everything was transparent to declarer. He confidently played the spade off dummy, catching West in an endplay – no matter which diamond they played, Kevin would ultimately score his •T.

A carefully played hand where Kevin was well rewarded with a top (93%) for his attention during the play, reacting perfectly as the distribution came to light.





The 2–3 August weekend saw NZBridge host a well-attended 20A North Island Pairs online tournament. 66 pairs entered, with the top 28 after day one advancing to the finals and the rest contesting the Plate.

Auckland–Northland players claimed half the podium. Ian and Graeme will soon represent New Zealand in the Open team, while Lysandra and Tim play in the Mixed.

We'll review a hand where all three podium pairs scored well.



Conventional wisdom says to bid your longest suit – even if it's unappealing – in search of a fit. Lysandra and Graeme, both sitting North faced this choice twice, once over 1♥ and once over 2♥.

Lysandra took the view that her hand was good for seven tricks but not eight, especially without a certain fit. With a questionable stopper in 843, she chose 1NT, reasoning it could survive five losers at the one level and partner might help – even Qx might prove a stopper if East leads "fourth best" from AKxxx.

Graeme took a more "standard" route with  $2\Phi$  – certainly his best suit, albeit not his longest – avoiding an uncertain club fit, especially when it forced the partnership to the 3-level. He went down one, but -50 was a good score compared to opponents making 2-level contracts or going down in  $2\Phi$ .

Meanwhile, Jeremy in West faced no such dilemma – while many Wests took no action over the takeout double, Jeremy didn't come here to pass. He kept the auction alive, and was happy to correct to 2♥ with an excellent doubleton after the 2♠ rebid. This saw his partner scoring 9 tricks on a misdefence, for +140 and a top board.



# TOURNAMENT SCHEDULING AND GRADING - CHANGES

Following a hui to consider **regional feedback**, a number of NZB Manual proposals were made to **NZBridge** and subsequently adopted.

# **Summary of changes:**

- Clubs are no longer limited to a fixed number of events in each grade
- Clubs may now offer a 2B one session tournament for charity and fundraising events.
- Non-consolation 3A tournaments are reserved for the Restricted Open category (National Master and below)
- Three weekends annually are reserved for online bridge

Decision-making about tournaments will happen at the regional rather than national level, with decisions to add and alter club tournaments ultimately being the responsibility of the **Regional Committee**.

Clubs are asked to remind juniors that they can "play up" and are welcome at intermediate tournaments where there are often prizes for the best junior pair.

# **REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS 2026**

New Zealand Bridge has redesigned the **Regional Championship** event. The trials winning pairs from each region will form teams to contest a **two day double round robin** to be held over **1 May-3 May 2026 online**. The top two teams from each category will then play each other in a **face-to-face playoff** of 48 boards to be held on the day prior to the National Congress in **November 2026**.

The ANRC will hold a trial to select the teams to contest this event from our region to be held **Saturday 31 January/Sunday 1 February online**. This trial will be a two-day round-robin Swiss Pairs.

### **Changes to Tournament Scheduling and Grading**

Following a hui to consider regional feedback a number of NZB Manual proposals were made to NZ Bridge and subsequently adopted.

### **Summary of changes:**

### Clubs are no longer limited to a fixed number of events in each grade

Although the Calendar of Events will roll over each year (2026 already appears) clubs can now apply to alter existing grades or add events -subject to some Manual conditions.

All decisions to add or alter club tournaments are now decided by your Regional Committee.

### **New 2B Event**

To raise the status of one session charity and fundraising events – above 40C sessions- clubs may now offer a 2B one session event. Entries should be open to all clubs - as currently happens in existing charity events and tournaments in general.

### 3A Changes

After feedback from clubs and players it has been decided to use the 3A point category for that area between high standard intermediates and lower ranked open grade players (up to National Master). With the exception of the traditional consolation events at regional congress weekends participants will no longer meet higher ranked open players including grand masters. These new events will be called "Restricted 3A". It is hoped that this will encourage greater entries and increase the competitiveness of participants currently struggling in A point events.

Note: - existing Open 3A events for 2025 may remain as open events

### On-line Events.

Three weekends per year (just December 20-21 for 2025) will be allocated to clubs offering on-line tournaments. All clubs can apply and there will be no F2F clashes.

No on-line tournaments will be held in the evenings or weekends other than above. B point on-line events can be offered mid-week during the day

### Multigrade 8B and Restricted 8B

This is not a change but these names still cause confusion.

A Restricted 8B allows for all grade combinations EXCEPT Open-Open

A Multigrade 8B has no restrictions ie allows for open-open as one grade.

A multigrade 5B has categories for Int-Int, Int-Jnr and Jnr-Jnr (no open players).
